

# 2008 Wittenberg University Football News & Notes - Nov. 8, 2008 at Allegheny



• **SETTING THE SCENE:** The Wittenberg Tigers head to Meadville, Pa., for a Week 10 meeting with the Allegheny Gators. With the home slate wrapped up, Wittenberg hits the road back-to-back weeks to close out the 2008 campaign in hopes of finishing the regular season with the momentum of a four-game win streak.

The Tigers are coming off their second shutout of the season, a 23-0 blanking of the Denison Big Red on Senior Recognition Day and Dave Maurer Day. Sophomore quarterback **Andrew Durbin** totaled three touchdowns on the day, one through the air and two on the ground, and the defense turned in perhaps its finest performance of the 2008 season in shutting down what had been the top rushing attack in the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC).

The Gators are hoping to rebound from a 35-21 loss at Wooster last week and work their way back to the .500 mark. Allegheny stands 3-5 overall and 2-3 in the NCAC.

• **SERIES HISTORY:** Saturday's meeting between the Tigers and the Gators will be the 20th in the history of the two programs, which have met every season since Wittenberg joined the NCAC in 1989. The Tigers hold an 11-8 edge in the overall series.

After falling in five of the first six meetings, Wittenberg rattled off six consecutive wins in the series from 1997-2002. The last two have also gone to Wittenberg, including a 17-6 win in 2007 in Meadville.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER OFFENSE:** After piling up more than 4,00 yards total offense in 23 straight starts, junior quarterback **Aaron Huffman** turned the ball over to senior quarterback **Matt Brumfield** midway through a Sept. 20 loss to Washington University after suffering a season-ending injury. Since then, Brumfield has split time since with **Andrew Durbin**, who has started the last two games against Carnegie Mellon and Denison. Brumfield and Durbin have combined for more than 1,300 yards and 12 touchdowns through the air, while completing more than 61 percent of their passes.

At tailback, the injury-plagued Tigers turned to freshman **Trevor Luckenbill** to carry the load after sophomore Corey Weber carried 25 times in a season-opening win over Olivet but was lost for the season with an injury. Luckenbill responded with 522 yards and four touchdowns during the middle stretch of the season, including a career-high 134 yards in a Homecoming win over Earlham, before also suffering an injury. In stepped junior **Jeff Wilbur** against Denison, and he ran for 53 yards on 11 carries. In short yardage, senior **Tony Hall**, who missed the entire 2007 season due to injury, has excelled. After going for a career-high 53 yards against Carnegie Mellon, Hall has 174 yards and seven touchdowns on the season.

At wide receiver, freshman **Josh McKee** has emerged as a perfect complement to senior **Patrick Williams**, who accumulated 910 yards and six touchdowns in 2007 and already has 45 catches for 586 yards and four touchdowns in 2008. McKee has added 39 receptions, 610 yards and a team-best nine touchdowns to the offensive attack.

• **DOUBLE DUTY:** Patrick Williams has been setting records on the gridiron and on the baseball field in his Wittenberg career.

## Dave Maurer Honorary Scholarship

After a whirlwind three-month fund-raising effort, the first-ever Dave Maurer Honorary Scholarship was awarded to football standout Brad McKinley, class of 2011 from Hilliard, Ohio, during a moving tribute program at Pam Evans Smith Arena in Wittenberg University's HPER Center Nov. 1.

The Dave Maurer Honorary Scholarship will be awarded annually to a sophomore, junior or senior male student with financial need who has demonstrated such qualities as self-discipline, teamwork, cooperation, hard work, self-confidence, pride in accomplishment, competitive spirit, and the ability to deal with adversity. It is a tuition scholarship that may be renewable on an annual basis or may be rotated, per the committee's discretion.

Maurer remains one of the most beloved Wittenberg leaders and mentors in the illustrious history of the university's varsity athletics program, especially among the student-athletes he guided on and off the field during his 40 years (1955-95) as an athletics administrator, professor and coach of the Tiger football, swimming, track and field, and golf teams. Maurer led the Tigers to three football national championships as the head coach and served as assistant coach for two other national title teams. In addition, the 1978 and 1979 squads finished second in the NCAA Division III Tournament. Maurer earned national coach of the year honors twice, district coach of the year four times and conference coach of the year five times. His career culminated with induction into the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1991, the first "true" NCAA Division III coach to garner such recognition.

After more than a decade as an assistant football coach, Maurer took the reins in 1969 from fellow National College Football Hall of Famer, Bill Edwards. Maurer posted a career record of 129-23-3, good for an .842 winning percentage, best among active coaches at that time. His Tiger teams went undefeated three times and won seven Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC) championships in his 15 seasons as head coach, to go along with seven OAC crowns during his years as an assistant coach.

## TUNE IN TO THE TIGERS!

All Wittenberg athletic broadcasts can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM, the university's student-operated station. They also can be heard around the world on the Internet thanks to Wittenberg's partnership with Stretch Internet. Wittenberg fans do not have to pay to listen to broadcasts, and anyone with a computer and an Internet connection can log in and listen.

Wittenberg is blessed with outstanding radio coverage again in 2008 as Scott Leo, who spends his summers as the play-by-play voice of the Columbus Clippers, heads things up. Leo, who has been involved with Wittenberg athletic broadcasts since 2000, is joined by Assistant Sports Information Director Ben Bradley on this fall's football broadcasts, as well as Zach Spring, class of 2011, when he is available.

The student broadcast team is bigger and better than ever in 2008-09, led by WUSO Sports Director Rob Lehner. The Wittenberg student broadcasters are involved in all aspects of the broadcasts, including sideline reporting, statistical analysis, on-air color analysis, in-game score updates and production work. This year, the team has ambitious plans to produce more than 100 athletics broadcasts in as many as 11 sports, including football, volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, field hockey, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, baseball and softball.

• **COACHES SHOW:** Tiger Talk is back again in 2008. It can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM and on the Internet from 7-8 p.m. every Thursday. Leo hosts the show, which features interviews with players and coaches and analysis of the Tigers' season to date.

Williams returned to the football starting lineup in 2008 after setting school records for receptions in a season (56) and a game (12 vs. Wabash) in 2007. He was the team leader in receptions and receiving yards by a wide margin a year ago after finishing second in both categories in 2006. With 45 receptions through eight games in 2008, Williams has moved into fifth place on the Wittenberg career receiving list with 128 in less than three full seasons in the football Red & White.

Williams has also started all but two of the Tigers' baseball games over the last three years. In 114 total games, including 112 starting assignments, the speedy outfielder ranked among the team leaders in numerous offensive categories in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Williams, who set a school record with a 27-game hitting streak stretching across the last 14 games of 2007 and the first 13 of 2008, has a career batting average of .342. A second-team All-NCAC honoree in 2006 and 2008 to go along with his first-team All-NCAC award in football in 2007, Williams has 31 doubles, six triples, six home runs, 85 RBI and 33 stolen bases in his baseball career.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER DEFENSE:** Wittenberg's defense has come together to form one of the most formidable units in the conference. While ranking first in the NCAC in scoring and total defense, the Tigers are also proving opportunistic, forcing 25 turnovers, including five in a 13-10 loss to third-ranked Wabash.

Leading the way for Wittenberg on the front four is sophomore end **Eddie Vallery**, who has done a little of everything in his first season as a starter. He has 40 tackles, including 4.5 for loss, two sacks, five pass break-ups, two forced fumbles and a blocked kick despite missing a game due to injury. The Tiger linebackers have been dynamic, led by sophomore **Brad McKinley** with 89 tackles, including 12 in a dominating performance against the Little Giants in which he finished with 12 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, an interception, three pass break-ups and a sack.

The Tiger secondary is led by sophomore safety **Manny Rodriguez** with 54 tackles, as well as a sack, six pass break-ups/passes defended and three forced fumbles, and junior cornerback **Brandyn Brown** with an interception, a forced fumble and a team-best 14 pass break-ups/passes defended.

• **NCAC PLAYERS OF THE WEEK:** Three Tiger players have earned NCAC Player of the Week awards in 2008.

The most recent award came after the Week 8 win over Denison as sophomore linebacker **Brad McKinley** earned Defensive Player of the Week for his 11-tackle, one-fumble recovery performance.

On Sept. 28, freshman linebacker Zach Hurtt picked up Defensive Player of the Week after he forced a fumble, intercepted a pass and made 12 tackles, leading the Tigers to a 32-0 defeat of Ohio Wesleyan. Hurtt had a hand in two of the five turnovers forced by Wittenberg.

Josh McKee earned Offensive Player of the Week honors on Oct. 7 after he caught eight passes for 177 yards and a touchdown, and rushed three times for another 18 yards, in the Tigers' 44-7 win over Hiram.

• **SCOUTING THE GATORS:** The offense centers around junior quarterback T.J. Salopek, who has just under 1,200 yards passing and six touchdowns. His favorite target is Jake Vite with 30 receptions and over 400 yards receiving. On the ground, the Gators turn to Matt Deivert, who leads the team with 70 carries and 227 yards.

Allegheny's stout defense is led in tackles by linebacker Andy Schliehauf and free safety C.J. Bell. Their efforts have contributed to a unit that allows 163 yards on the ground per contest, good for fifth in the league.

• **THE COACHES:** Wittenberg is led by Joe Fincham, a 1988 graduate of Ohio University. In his 12th season at the helm, Fincham has a 114-27 overall record, including a mark of 78-12 in the NCAC and a regular season record of 107-21. His teams have claimed six conference titles, including four straight outright with undefeated records from 1998-2001. Fincham has been named NCAC Coach of the Year five times, including 2006 after he led the Tigers to a conference title, and earned American Football Coaches Association/Kodak District IV Coach of the Year honors in 1998.

Fincham stands seconds in school history with 112 wins, trailing only National College Football Hall of Famer Dave Maurer, who posted a 129-23-3 record between 1969-83. Fincham is third in winning percentage as his .803 mark trails Maurer (.842) and fellow National College Football Hall of Famer Bill Edwards, who had a 98-20-4 record between 1955-69.

The Gators are led by Mark Matlak, in his eighth year at the helm of his alma mater's program with a 34-35 record. His coaching experience also includes a 13-year stint as the defensive coordinator at New Hampshire, while totaling 18 years at the institution. Matlak is a 1989 inductee of the Allegheny Athletic Hall of Fame.
