Pre-Game News & Notes - Oct. 25, 2008 vs. Carnegie Mellon

• **SETTING THE SCENE:** Wittenberg takes on its final non-conference opponent of the 2008 campaign as the Tigers make the long trip to Pittsburgh, Pa., to take on the Carnegie Mellon Tartans. Coming off a tough loss at the hands of North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC) rival Wabash, the Tigers look to rebound and even their record against the University Athletic Association at 1-1.

Wittenberg, which sits at 4-2 and 3-1 in the NCAC, and the rest of the conference is in the first year of a scheduling agreement with the UAA. The Tigers lost to Washington University, 30-27, on Sept. 20, part of a dominating UAA performance in games between teams from the two conferences. The four UAA programs have an 11-4 record against the nine NCAC teams participating in the scheduling agreement.

The Tartans come in with an identical mark at 4-2, thanks to a 4-0 record against NCAC foes, including a 41-14 victory over the Allegheny Gators in their most recent contest two weeks ago. Carnegie Mellon has yet to play a game within the four-team University Athletic Association.

• **SERIES HISTORY:** Wittenberg has never played a football team called "Carnegie Mellon," but the Tartans do claim a 2-0 series advantage. Carnegie Tech, as CMU was once known, played Wittenberg in the 1938 and 1939 seasons, and the Tartans won by scores of 32-13 and 35-0.

In the new agreement between the NCAC and the UAA, the two teams will also play next year, on Oct. 24 in Springfield.

• **NATIONAL EXPOSURE:** Saturday's contest against CMU will be broadcast in tape delay on ESPN2 on Sunday, Oct. 26 at 2 p.m. EST. The broadcast is part of the CMU Homecoming festivities.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER OFFENSE:** After piling up more than 3,600 passing yards and 400 rushing yards in 23 straight starts, junior quarterback **Aaron Huffman** turned the ball over to senior quarterback **Matt Brumfield** midway through the loss to Washington University after suffering a season-ending injury. Brumfield has played well in relief, completing more than 50 percent of his passes for 563 yards and five touchdowns while sharing time with sophomore quarterback **Andrew Durbin**, who has come on strong to complete 30-of-45 passes for 404 yards, four touchdowns and no interceptions. Durbin played the majority of the game against Wabash last week.

Also impacted by injury at the tailback position, the Tigers have turned to freshman **Trevor Luckenbill**, who has carried the load the last three weeks. Last week against Earlham, Luckenbill set a high-water mark in his young career, taking 15 carries for 134 yards and a score. In short yardage, senior **Tony Hall** continues to make a resurgence, scoring seven touchdowns in the last three contests after missing the entire 2007 season due to injury.

At wide receiver, freshman **Josh McKee** has emerged as a perfect complement to senior **Patrick Williams**, who accumulated 910 yards and six touchdowns in 2007 and already has 29 catches for 368 yards in 2008. McKee, who was held without a catch in the loss to Wabash, has team-highs of 32 receptions, 574 yards and eight touchdowns through his first six collegiate games.

• **DOUBLE DUTY:** Patrick Williams has been setting records on the gridiron and on the baseball field in his Wittenberg career.

Williams returned to the football starting lineup in 2008 after setting school records for receptions in a season (56) and a game (12 vs. Wabash) in 2007. He was the team leader in receptions and receiving yards by a wide margin a year ago after finishing second in both categories in 2006. With 29 receptions through six games in 2008, Williams has moved into sixth place on the Wittenberg career receiving list with 112 in less than three full seasons in the football Red & White.

Williams has also started all but two of the Tigers' baseball games over the last three years. In 114 total games, including 112 starting assignments, the speedy outfielder ranked among the team leaders in numerous offensive categories in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Williams, who set a school record with a 27-game hitting streak stretching across the last 14 games of 2007 and the first 13 of 2008, has a career batting average of .342. A second-team All-NCAC honoree in 2006 and 2008 to go along with his first-team All-NCAC award in football in 2007, Williams has 31 doubles, six triples, six home runs, 85 RBI and 33 stolen bases in his baseball career.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER DEFENSE:** Wittenberg's defense has come together to form one of the most formidable units in the conference. While ranking first in the NCAC in rushing defense and second in total defense, the Tigers are also proving opportunistic, forcing 15 turnovers, including five in last week's loss to Wabash.

Leading the way for Wittenberg on the front four is sophomore end **Eddie Vallery**, who has done a little of everything in his first season as a starter. He has 31 tackles, including 4.5 for loss, two sacks, four pass break-ups, two forced fumbles and a blocked kick. In the linebacking core, sophomore **Brad McKinley** leads all Tigers with 65 tackles after a dominating performance against the Little Giants. He finished with 12 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, an interception, three pass break-ups and a sack.

TUNE IN TO THE TIGERS!

All Wittenberg athletic broadcasts can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM, the university's student-operated station. They also can be heard around the world on the Internet thanks to Wittenberg's partnership with Stretch Internet. Wittenberg fans do not have to pay to listen to broadcasts, and anyone with a computer and an Internet connection can log in and listen.

Wittenberg is blessed with outstanding radio coverage again in 2008 as Scott Leo, who spends his summers as the play-by-play voice of the Columbus Clippers, heads things up. Leo, who has been involved with Wittenberg athletic broadcasts since 2000, is joined by Assistant Sports Information Director Ben Bradley on this fall's football broadcasts.

The student broadcast team is bigger and better than ever in 2008-09, led by WUSO Sports Director Rob Lehner. The Wittenberg student broadcasters are involved in all aspects of the broadcasts, including sideline reporting, statistical analysis, on-air color analysis, in-game score updates and production work. This year, the team has ambitious plans to produce more than 100 athletics broadcasts in as many as 11 sports, including football, volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, field hockey, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, baseball and softball.

• **COACHES SHOW:** Tiger Talk is back again in 2008. It can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM and on the Internet from 7-8 p.m. every Thursday. Leo hosts the show, which features interviews with players and coaches and analysis of the Tigers' season to date.

The Tiger secondary is led by sophomore safety **Manny Rodriguez** with 37 tackles, as well as a sack, six pass break-ups and three forced fumbles, and junior cornerback **Brandyn Brown** with an interception, a forced fumble and a team-best 11 pass break-ups.

• **NCAC PLAYERS OF THE WEEK:** Two Tiger players have earned NCAC Player of the Week awards in 2008. Ironically, both have been freshmen.

On Sept. 28, freshman linebacker Zach Hurtt picked up Defensive Player of the Week after he forced a fumble, intercepted a pass and made 12 tackles, leading the Tigers to a 32-0 defeat of Ohio Wesleyan. Hurtt had a hand in two of the five turnovers forced by Wittenberg.

Josh McKee earned Offensive Player of the Week honors on Oct. 7 after he caught eight passes for 177 yards and a touchdown, and rushed three times for another 18 yards, in the Tigers' 44-7 win over Hiram.

• **SCOUTING THE TARTANS:** Carnegie Mellon will showcase an offensive style that Tigers have not seen for a few weeks when they go to the ground this Saturday. The Tartans have accumulated more than 250 yards per game rushing in 2008, led by fullback **Anthony Ruzga** with 110 carries for 539 yards. **Chris Garcia** and **Ryan Phillips** have combined for 122 touches for more than 600 combined yards.

When CMU goes to the air, quarterback **Phil Pantalone** will look to find receiver **Brendan Howe**, who leads the team with 14 receptions.

Defensively, the Tartans will turn to safety **Jon Scholl** and linebacker **Aleksey Tigay**, who lead the team in tackles with 60 and 43, respectively.

• **THE COACHES:** Wittenberg is led by Joe Fincham, a 1988 graduate of Ohio University. In his 12th season at the helm, Fincham has a 112-28 overall record, including a mark of 78-12 in the NCAC and a regular season record of 105-22. His teams have claimed six conference titles, including four straight outright with undefeated records from 1998-2001. Fincham has been named NCAC Coach of the Year five times, including 2006 after he led the Tigers to a conference title, and earned American Football Coaches Association/Kodak District IV Coach of the Year honors in 1998.

Fincham stands second in school history with 112 wins, trailing only National College Football Hall of Famer Dave Maurer, who posted a 129-23-3 record between 1969-83. Fincham is third in winning percentage as his .803 mark trails Maurer (.842) and fellow National College Football Hall of Famer Bill Edwards, who had a 98-20-4 record between 1955-69.

Carnegie Mellon is led by Rich Lackner, who is in his 23rd year coaching his alma mater. Lackner has compiled a record of 160-66-2 during that time, which has included eight UAA titles and five UAA Coach of the Year selections. Between his playing years and his coaching time at CMU, Lackner has enjoyed 33 consecutive non-losing seasons as well as eight NCAA playoff appearances.

• **DAVE MAURER DAY:** In recognition of his impact on thousands of lives in nearly 40 years as a coach, administrator and professor at Wittenberg, the Wittenberg Committee to Honor Dave Maurer has formed to celebrate Dave Maurer Day on Saturday, Nov. 1. The event coincides with Wittenberg's final regular season home game against NCAC rival Denison, which kicks off at 1 p.m. that day at Edwards-Maurer Field.

Maurer will be informally honored at halftime of the football game. A reunion dinner for Maurer, his family, friends, former players, fans and supporters will follow in Pam Evans Smith Arena in the HPER Center, starting with a social hour at 5 p.m.

Maurer, a 1987 Wittenberg Athletics Hall of Honor inductee, coached track and field, swimming and diving, and golf at various points during his Wittenberg career, in addition to his well-known exploits on the football sidelines. He also served as the university's director of men's athletics and was a professor of health and physical education.

After more than a decade as an assistant football coach at Wittenberg, Maurer took the reins in 1969. He posted a career record of 129-23-3, good for an .842 winning percentage, and directed three teams to national championships. The Tigers went undefeated three times and won seven Ohio Athletic Conference championships in his 15 seasons as head coach.
