Pre-Game News & Notes - Oct. 11, 2008 vs. Earlham

• **SETTING THE SCENE:** The Wittenberg Tigers moved to 2-0 in the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC) with a 44-7 win over the Hiram Terriers last week. The Tigers hope to keep the momentum going when Earlham comes to town for Homecoming weekend in Springfield.

The Quakers gave undefeated Wooster all it could handle last week, falling on a late field goal by a final of 16-14. Earlham is still in search of its first win of 2008 after dropping its three non-conference games of the season before the narrow defeat against the Scots. The Tigers topped the Quakers last year in Richmond, Ind., by 73-0 score.

• **SERIES HISTORY:** The Tigers and Quakers meet for 35th time in the series, with Wittenberg holding a 26-8-0 record over Earlham. The Tigers have outscored Earlham 944-327. The last time Earlham beat Wittenberg was 1909, when the Tigers fell 31-0. The Tigers hand Quakers did not meet between 1919 and 1989, the year the two schools joined the NCAC together.

• **ATHLETICS HALL OF HONOR CLASS OF 2008:** Wittenberg's Athletics Hall of Honor will add six members during 2008 Homecoming Weekend ceremonies:

Bruce Borland '69 - A four-year and starter at linebacker on football teams that went 28-7 overall and 14-5 in the rugged Ohio Athletic Conference, Borland was a two-time all-conference honoree, and he was team MVP and the team's Golden Helmet award-winner as a senior.

Pat Williams Clouse '64 - Clouse excelled in multiple sports as a student-athlete before making her mark as a coach for Tiger women's lacrosse, women's golf, women's swimming and diving and bowling, in addition to serving as chair of the Health, Fitness and Sport Department for 12 years.

Wendel Donathan '89 - Donathan is the most decorated wrestler in Wittenberg history who posted a career record of 106-28-4. A three-time team MVP, Donathan is the only Wittenberg wrestler to win 100 career matches and earn All-America honors, which he did in 1989.

David Helm '69 - A four-year letterwinner, two-year captain and two-time team MVP in track and field, Helm became one of three Tigers in Wittenberg history to score more than 100 individual points in two consecutive OAC Championship meets. Helm still holds the Wittenberg stadium record in the long jump with a mark of 22 feet, 2 and ½ inches.

Don Lynam '75 - Lynam helped the Tiger basketball team to four-year records of 61-16 overall and 30-7 in the OAC, two consecutive OAC regular season championships, an OAC Tournament championship and four NCAA Division III Tournament victories.

Jennifer Parsons '94 - One of a select group of Wittenberg student-athletes to earn 12 varsity letters in her collegiate career, Parsons earned four All-NCAC honors between basketball and volleyball and served as team captain in both sports. Also an all-region softball selection, Parsons continues to rank in the top 10 in career record lists in all three sports. She went on to serve as an assistant coach in all three sports at her alma mater, including an eight-year run with the nationally ranked volleyball program.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER OFFENSE:** The Wittenberg offense has a different look now that junior quarterback **Aaron Huffman** is sidelined for the season. After piling up more than 3,600 passing yards and 400 rushing yards in 23 straight starts, Huffman turned the ball over to senior quarterback **Matt Brumfield** midway through the loss to Washington University.

Brumfield has played well in relief, completing 11-of-18 passes for 134 yards and a touchdown in less than a half against Washington University. In his first two starts of 2008, Brumfield managed the offense well in big wins over Ohio Wesleyan and Hiram, including a career-high 243 passing yards against the Terriers. Sophomore quarterback **Andrew Durbin** saw his first extended collegiate action against Hiram, making the most of his opportunity by going 8-for-11 with a touchdown.

There isn't a position on the field left untouched by the injury bug, including running back. Fortunately, the Tigers have depth at that spot, as freshman **Trevor Luckenbill** has carried the load the last two weeks, piling up more than 200 yards in wins against OWU and Hiram, including a breakout game against Ohio Wesleyan with 117 yards on 19 carries. In short yardage, senior **Tony Hall** continues to make a resurgence, scoring five touchdowns in the last two contests after missing the entire 2007 season due to injury.

At wide receiver, freshman **Josh McKee** has emerged as a perfect complement to senior **Patrick Williams**, who accumulated 910 yards and six touchdowns in 2007 and already has 21 catches for 348 yards in 2008. McKee has 23 receptions for a whopping 444 yards and seven touchdowns through his first four collegiate games.

• **DOUBLE DUTY:** Patrick Williams has been setting records on the gridiron and on the baseball field in his Wittenberg career.

Williams returned to the football starting lineup in 2008 after setting school records for receptions in a season (56) and a game (12 vs. Wabash) in 2007. He was the team leader in receptions and receiving yards by a wide margin a year ago after finishing second in both categories in 2006.

With 21 receptions through four games in 2008, Williams has moved into sixth place on the Wittenberg career receiving list with 104. At his current pace, Williams could move as high as third place on the list, currently occupied by Rod Miller (1964-67) with 143 career catches, by the end of this, his third season in the football Red & White.

In addition, Williams has started all but two of the Tigers' baseball games over the last three years.

TUNE IN TO THE TIGERS!

All Wittenberg athletic broadcasts can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM, the university's student-operated station. They also can be heard around the world on the Internet thanks to Wittenberg's partnership with Stretch Internet. Wittenberg fans do not have to pay to listen to broadcasts, and anyone with a computer and an Internet connection can log in and listen.

Wittenberg is blessed with outstanding radio coverage again in 2008 as Scott Leo, who spends his summers as the play-by-play voice of the Columbus Clippers, heads things up. Leo, who has been involved with Wittenberg athletic broadcasts since 2000, will be joined by Assistant Sports Information Director Ben Bradley and Wittenberg sophomore Zach Spring on the majority of this fall's football broadcasts.

The student broadcast team is bigger and better than ever in 2008-09, led by WUSO Sports Director Rob Lehner. The Wittenberg student broadcasters are involved in all aspects of the broadcasts, including sideline reporting, statistical analysis, on-air color analysis, in-game score updates and production work. This year, the team has ambitious plans to produce more than 100 athletics broadcasts in as many as 11 sports, including football, volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, field hockey, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, baseball and softball.

• **COACHES SHOW:** Tiger Talk is back again in 2008. It can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM and on the Internet from 7-8 p.m. every Thursday. Leo hosts the show, which features interviews with players and coaches and analysis of the Tigers' season to date.

In 114 total games, including 112 starting assignments, the speedy outfielder ranked among the team leaders in numerous offensive categories in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Williams, who set a school record with a 27-game hitting streak stretching across the last 14 games of 2007 and the first 13 of 2008, has a career batting average of .342. A second-team All-NCAC honoree in 2006 and 2008 to go along with his first-team All-NCAC award in football in 2007, Williams has 31 doubles, six triples, six home runs, 85 RBI and 33 stolen bases in his baseball career.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER DEFENSE:** Wittenberg's defense has come together to form one of the most formidable units in the conference. While ranking first in the NCAC in rushing defense and total defense, the Tigers are also proving opportunistic, recovering seven of eight forced fumbles while also taking in three interceptions through the first four games.

Leading the way for Wittenberg on the front four is junior tackle **Taylor Scherer** with two sacks and three tackles for a loss. Sophomore tackle **Adam Kattoua** has 11 tackles with a fumble recovery. In the linebacking core, **Brad McKinley** leads all Tigers with 37 tackles, while **Kyle Lohrman** has 32, including 2.5 for a loss.

The Tiger secondary is led by sophomore safety **Manny Rodriguez** with 30 tackles, as well as a sack and two forced fumbles.

• **THE BIG HURTT:** Freshman linebacker **Zach Hurtt** has broken through with back-to-back big games. Coming off a strong performance against OWU in which he was named NCAC Defensive Player of the Week, Hurtt followed up with a 13-tackle outing against Hiram, which included a sack and a fumble recovery. On the season, Hurtt is fourth on the team in tackles with 29, has an interception, and was a part of two fumbles.

• **SCOUTING THE QUAKERS:** Earlham comes to Springfield trying to turn around an 0-4 start to the season. In their first conference game, the Quakers gave Wooster a scare before falling 16-14 on a late field goal.

The offense is paced by quarterback **Randy Kerns**, who has completed 99-of-167 passes for 1,046 yards and six scores. **Bryant Foreman** has been his favorite target, with 23 catches for 267 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, the Quakers are led by sophomore safety **Ben Randall**, who has 36 tackles and an interception to his credit.

• **THE COACHES:** Wittenberg is led by **Joe Fincham**, a 1988 graduate of Ohio University. In his 12th season at the helm, Fincham has a 110-26 overall record, including a mark of 75-11 in the NCAC and a regular season record of 102-19. His teams have claimed six conference titles, including four straight outright with undefeated records from 1998-2001. Fincham has been named NCAC Coach of the Year five times, including 2006 after he led the Tigers to a conference title, and earned American Football Coaches Association/Kodak District IV Coach of the Year honors in 1998.

Fincham stands second in school history with 110 wins, trailing only National College Football Hall of Famer Dave Maurer, who posted a 129-23-3 record between 1969-83. Fincham is third in winning percentage as his .806 mark trails Maurer (.842) and fellow National College Football Hall of Famer Bill Edwards, who had a 98-20-4 record between 1955-69.

Earlham is coached by Gerry Keesling, in his fifth year as the head coach of the Quakers. A 1982 Earlham graduate, Keesling served as offensive coordinator from 1992-2002 before compiling a record of 11-33 in his head coaching career.

• **DAVE MAURER DAY:** In recognition of his impact on thousands of lives

in nearly 40 years as a coach, administrator and professor at Wittenberg, the Wittenberg Committee to Honor Dave Maurer has formed to celebrate Dave Maurer Day on Saturday, Nov. 1. The event coincides with Wittenberg's final regular season home game against NCAC rival Denison, which kicks off at 1 p.m. that day at Edwards-Maurer Field.

Maurer will be informally honored at halftime of the football game. A reunion dinner for Maurer, his family, friends, former players, fans and supporters will follow in Pam Evans Smith Arena in the HPER Center, starting with a social hour at 5 p.m.

Maurer, a 1987 Wittenberg Athletics Hall of Honor inductee, coached track and field, swimming and diving, and golf at various points during his Wittenberg career, in addition to his well-known exploits on the football sidelines. He also served as the university's director of men's athletics and was a professor of health and physical education.

After more than a decade as an assistant football coach at Wittenberg, Maurer took the reins in 1969. He posted a career record of 129-23-3, good for an .842 winning percentage, and directed three teams to national championships. The Tigers went undefeated three times and won seven Ohio Athletic Conference championships in his 15 seasons as head coach.
