

# 2008 Wittenberg University Football

## Pre-Game News & Notes - Oct. 18, 2008 vs. Wabash

• **SETTING THE SCENE:** The Wittenberg Tigers picked up their third conference win of the season last week by beating Earlham College 45-13 to stay perfect at 3-0 in the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC). The Tigers sit in a three-way tie atop the conference standings with the College of Wooster and this week's opponent, defending champion Wabash College.

The rivalry between the Tigers and Little Giants has intensified in recent years as six of the eight conference titles since Wabash joined the NCAC in 2000 have gone to either Wittenberg or Wabash, with the Little Giants owning three outright and one shared title and the Tigers holding two outright and one shared. The Little Giants have just one conference loss in the last three years, that coming against Wittenberg in 2006 by a 19-17 score in Springfield.

• **SERIES HISTORY:** The Tigers lead the overall series against the Little Giants 6-5, with nine of the 11 meetings coming since 2000, the year Wabash joined the NCAC. The home team has won the last five meetings; the last time the road team won was 2002, when Wabash won a wild contest in Springfield 46-43. The two teams also met in the NCAA Division III Playoffs later that year, with Wabash winning in Crawfordsville 25-14.

The last meeting between the two teams resulted in a 24-17 Wabash win a year ago, the Tigers' lone conference loss in the 2007 season.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER OFFENSE:** After piling up more than 3,600 passing yards and 400 rushing yards in 23 straight starts, junior quarterback **Aaron Huffman** turned the ball over to senior quarterback **Matt Brumfield** midway through the loss to Washington University after suffering a season-ending injury. Brumfield has played well in relief, completing more than 50 percent of his passes for 563 yards and five touchdowns while sharing time with sophomore quarterback **Andrew Durbin**, who has come on strong to complete 20-of-25 passes for 285 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions.

Also impacted by injury at the tailback position, the Tigers have turned to freshman **Trevor Luckenbill**, who has carried the load the last three weeks. Last week against Earlham, Luckenbill set a high-water mark in his young career, taking 15 carries for 134 yards and a score. In short yardage, senior **Tony Hall** continues to make a resurgence, scoring seven touchdowns in the last three contests after missing the entire 2007 season due to injury.

At wide receiver, freshman **Josh McKee** has emerged as a perfect complement to senior **Patrick Williams**, who accumulated 910 yards and six touchdowns in 2007 and already has 26 catches for 332 yards in 2008. McKee has 32 receptions for a whopping 574 yards and eight touchdowns through his first five collegiate games.

• **DOUBLE DUTY:** Patrick Williams has been setting records on the gridiron and on the baseball field in his Wittenberg career.

Williams returned to the football starting lineup in 2008 after setting school records for receptions in a season (56) and a game (12 vs. Wabash) in 2007. He was the team leader in receptions and receiving yards by a wide margin a year ago after finishing second in both categories in 2006.

With 26 receptions through four games in 2008, Williams has moved into sixth place on the Wittenberg career receiving list with 109. At his current pace, Williams could move as high as third place on the list, currently occupied by Rod Miller (1964-67) with 143 career catches, by the end of this, his third season in the football Red & White.

In addition, Williams has started all but two of the Tigers' baseball games over the last three years. In 114 total games, including 112 starting assignments, the speedy outfielder ranked among the team leaders in numerous offensive categories in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Williams, who set a school record with a 27-game hitting streak stretching across the last 14 games of 2007 and the first 13 of 2008, has a career batting average of .342. A second-team All-NCAC honoree in 2006 and 2008 to go along with his first-team All-NCAC award in football in 2007, Williams has 31 doubles, six triples, six home runs, 85 RBI and 33 stolen bases in his baseball career.

• **SCOUTING THE TIGER DEFENSE:** Wittenberg's defense has come together to form one of the most formidable units in the conference. While ranking first in the NCAC in rushing defense and total defense, the Tigers are also proving opportunistic, recovering seven of eight forced fumbles while also taking in three interceptions through the first five games.

Leading the way for Wittenberg on the front four is junior tackle **Taylor Scherer** with two sacks and three tackles for a loss. Sophomore tackle **Adam Kattoua** has 13 tackles with a fumble recovery. In the linebacking core, sophomore **Brad McKinley** leads all Tigers with 53 tackles, while sophomore **Kyle Lohrman** has 41, including 3.5 for a loss, and freshman **Zach Hurtt** also has 41.

The Tiger secondary is led by sophomore safety **Manny Rodriguez** with 33 tackles, as well as a sack and two forced fumbles.

• **THE BIG HURTT:** The linebacker with the appropriate last name has broken through with three straight double-figure tackle games since moving into the starting lineup. Coming off a strong

## TUNE IN TO THE TIGERS!

All Wittenberg athletic broadcasts can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM, the university's student-operated station. They also can be heard around the world on the Internet thanks to Wittenberg's partnership with Stretch Internet. Wittenberg fans do not have to pay to listen to broadcasts, and anyone with a computer and an Internet connection can log in and listen.

Wittenberg is blessed with outstanding radio coverage again in 2008 as Scott Leo, who spends his summers as the play-by-play voice of the Columbus Clippers, heads things up. Leo, who has been involved with Wittenberg athletic broadcasts since 2000, will be joined by Assistant Sports Information Director Ben Bradley and Wittenberg sophomore Zach Spring on the majority of this fall's football broadcasts.

The student broadcast team is bigger and better than ever in 2008-09, led by WUSO Sports Director Rob Lehner. The Wittenberg student broadcasters are involved in all aspects of the broadcasts, including sideline reporting, statistical analysis, on-air color analysis, in-game score updates and production work. This year, the team has ambitious plans to produce more than 100 athletics broadcasts in as many as 11 sports, including football, volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, field hockey, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, baseball and softball.

• **COACHES SHOW:** Tiger Talk is back again in 2008. It can be heard locally on WUSO 89.1-FM and on the Internet from 7-8 p.m. every Thursday. Leo hosts the show, which features interviews with players and coaches and analysis of the Tigers' season to date.

performance against Ohio Wesleyan for which he was named NCAC Defensive Player of the Week, Hurtt followed up with a 13-tackle outing against Hiram, which included a sack and a fumble recovery. On the season, Hurtt has moved up to third on the team in tackles with 41, has an interception, 1.5 sacks, and was a part of two fumbles.

• **SCOUTING THE LITTLE GIANTS:** Wabash is off to an exceptional start to the 2008 season, streaking to a 5-0 start while piling up close to 500 yards of offense per game. The Little Giants moved up to sixth in the country according to d3football.com in the latest polls.

The potent aerial attack for Wabash is led by returning All-NCAC quarterback Matt Hudson, who has already accumulated more than 1,400 yards and 20 scores through the air. His favorite target has been sophomore wide receiver Kody Lemond, who has 12 touchdown receptions and almost 800 yards receiving after seeing limited action a year ago.

On the ground, Wabash turns to a duo of backs, with Bobby Kimp carrying the majority of the load with 84 carries and 437 yards. Derrick Yoder has also seen significant touches, with 54 totes for 278 yards and three scores.

Defensively, the Little Giants are led in tackles by junior linebacker Bryan Watson, while defensive lineman Matt Whyde has three sacks to his credit.

• **NATIONAL RANKINGS:** Wittenberg is ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and sacks allowed per game, while Wabash leads all of NCAA Division III in scoring offense and kickoff return yardage per attempt.

Individually, Saturday's game features two of the nation's most prolific receivers in Wittenberg freshman Josh McKee, who ranks 19th in the nation with 114 receiving yards per game, and Wabash sophomore Kody Lemond, who ranks second in receiving yards, fourth in scoring and 14th in receptions per game. Little Giants quarterback Matt Hudson ranks third nationally in passing efficiency.

• **THE COACHES:** Wittenberg is led by **Joe Fincham**, a 1988 graduate of Ohio University. In his 12th season at the helm, Fincham has a 112-26 overall record, including a mark of 77-11 in the NCAC and a regular season record of 105-20. His teams have claimed six conference titles, including four straight outright with undefeated records from 1998-2001. Fincham has been named NCAC Coach of the Year five times and earned American Football Coaches Association/Kodak District IV Coach of the Year honors in 1998.

Fincham trails only National College Football Hall of Famer Dave Maurer, who posted a 129-23-3 record between 1969-83. Fincham is third in winning percentage as his .806 mark trails Maurer (.842) and fellow National College Football Hall of Famer Bill Edwards, who had a 98-20-4 record between 1955-69.

Wabash is led by Erik Raeburn, who is in his first season after eight seasons at Coe College (IA), where he posted a 57-23 record. He also has experience as an offensive line coach and coordinator for Mount Union College, his alma mater.

• **DAVE MAURER DAY:** In recognition of his impact on thousands of lives in nearly 40 years as a coach, administrator and professor at Wittenberg, the Wittenberg Committee to Honor Dave Maurer has formed to celebrate Dave

Maurer Day on Saturday, Nov. 1. The event coincides with Wittenberg's final regular season home game against NCAC rival Denison, which kicks off at 1 p.m. that day at Edwards-Maurer Field.

Maurer will be informally honored at halftime of the football game. A reunion dinner for Maurer, his family, friends, former players, fans and supporters will follow in Pam Evans Smith Arena in the HPER Center, starting with a social hour at 5 p.m.

Maurer, a 1987 Wittenberg Athletics Hall of Honor inductee, coached track and field, swimming and diving, and golf at various points during his Wittenberg career, in addition to his well-known exploits on the football sidelines. He also served as the university's director of men's athletics and was a professor of health and physical education.

After more than a decade as an assistant football coach at Wittenberg, Maurer took the reins in 1969. He posted a career record of 129-23-3, good for an .842 winning percentage, and directed three teams to national championships. The Tigers went undefeated three times and won seven Ohio Athletic Conference championships in his 15 seasons as head coach.
